# **Important Reminders**


- \*Please have your child at school before 8 a.m. every morning so he/she does not miss our Morning Meeting that begins at 8 a.m.


## 3-8 Math/Science

Last month in science, the third to fifth graders completed their research on volcanoes and earthquakes and had the opportunity to share what they learned with Mrs. Lipar's class. We then began a study of natural resources. The third graders' research focused on how we can conserve our natural resources, while the fourth graders focused on renewable vs. nonrenewable

resources and fifth graders on how fossil fuels are created and used. Then we began researching





















The sixth to eighth graders finished their research and presentations on alternative energy at the beginning of January. They studied the advantages and disadvantages of each type of energy and evaluated what they had learned to predict what energy sources they believe our country will pursue in the future. Then the sixth graders studied the

layers of the earth and drew models on the basketball court which they presented as "museum exhibits" to the kindergarten to fifth grade students. The seventh graders studied severe weather and created various projects that can be used to teach younger





students about severe weather and safety precautions. The eighth graders studied the cycles of day and night, seasons, the moon, and the tides and applied what they learned to predict what might happen to those cycles in case of an unusual event such as an asteroid breaking our moon in

two. Next month, we will learn about tectonic plates, rocks, water, space and space exploration.

Last month in math, the third to fifth graders worked on multiplication and division and fraction concepts. Depending on the needs of the student, these are some of the skills they may have worked on:

- \*Memorization of multiplication facts
- \*Function tables (input/output tables)
- \*Multiplication and division with variables
- \*Comparing and ordering fractions
- \*Equivalent fractions
- \*Adding and subtracting fractions with like denominators
- \*Adding and subtracting fractions with unlike denominators
- \*Multiplying fractions

Next month we will work on a few more fraction concepts and then begin our unit on measurement and measurement conversions.

The sixth to eighth graders have continued to work on measurement concepts, extending what we learned about squares and rectangles to triangles, parallelograms, trapezoidal, and irregular objects. As we finish our measurement study, we will learn about the measurements of circles and additional 3D shapes and then we will go into 2 dimensional geometry.

In Algebra, we have been working with exponential functions and their equations. After completing this unit, we will begin studying quadratic










functions and their equations.

We want to encourage all students to continue to work on fact fluency at home. A few minutes a day of reviewing in the car or playing on an app can really help students gain automaticity and confidence with math facts, which is so critical for building their math skills.

We will also spend some time in math and science next month preparing our portfolios. We look forward to sharing them with you at the end of February!
