October was another fun filled month in Pre-K. We started our fun by going on a bear hunt. The class made it through the thick oozy mud, a deep cold river, a swirling whirling snowstorm, and a big dark forest to find the bear cave. The cave was filled with sleeping bears. We were very excited that the bears left us a yummy bear snack to enjoy. The school also enjoyed an informational visit from the fire department. A big thank you to our community first responders! We completed our pumpkin investigation by sink or float prediction, pumpkin seed estimation and what's on the inside.

Grades K-1

October was a great month in the Investigator classroom! The highlight of our month was definitely getting class pets. Our class received a Pets in the Classroom grant from Petco, which we used to purchase three zebra danios and three guppies. Dr. Carroll and her husband, Eddie Wilson offered to get us a small mammal. After researching all of our options, we decided to get fancy mice. They don't like to be alone, and we didn't want to separate three brothers... so we ended up with three fancy mice! We have been observing their behaviors and learning how to take care of them.

In reading workshop, we have been developing our strategies for figuring out unknown words. We have also been reviewing some comprehension strategies we learned last year, such as making predictions and connections. Next month, we will be focusing on story elements.

In writing workshop, we have been working hard to write a personal narrative, a story about something that happened to us. We are beginning to think about how we can make our stories easier for our readers to understand by doing things such as adding details and putting spaces between our words.

In math, we have been working on strategies for subtraction. We are also working on improving our addition fact fluency. Next month, we will be working on strategies for adding and subtracting larger numbers, including double digits for those who are ready.

In science, we continued to work with the properties of light, including reflection and refraction. Then we learned about different ways we can use light









and sound to communicate. We also started a unit where we will be learning about different animal parts and how they help animals survive. Next month, we will continue learning about animal characteristics and then begin our study of plant characteristics.

In social studies, we finished our study of Texas and maps. We are now learning about the United States government and leaders. We also discussed several holidays, including Dia de Los Muertos, Halloween, and Diwali. Next month, we will talk more about the upcoming elections and the president. We will also be learning about Native American groups.

Grades 1-2

October was a whirlwind! I cannot believe it is already over. Our class has been busy. We are a cohesive unit now and friendships are blossoming. It is nice to see the class work together to accomplish their goals throughout the learning process.

In reading workshop the class learned how to visualize a story. We've also been making predictions through our read alouds. We continue to review reading strategies in conferences. We will continue our author studies and learn the various techniques used by different authors in their writing. We will also learn different types of poetry and begin to write some of our own.

In writing workshop we focused on how to extend our writing using our topic "bubble maps" or graphic organizers. Students are continuing to add more detail in their writing. Our Share Chair time is critical in the building of self-esteem. It also offers positive encouragement to each student. They love to hear from their peers. The kids are always eager to share their writing with the class. We will continue to focus on punctuation and capitalization as well as extending our writing.

In math workshop we've practiced place value, expanded notation, math vocabulary, adding and subtracting within 20, double digits and comparing numbers using greater than, less than and equal to symbols. The challenge activities offered have been very popular and most of the students want to try them. We are moving on to subtraction within 20, triple digit addition and subtraction and repeated addition (foundation for multiplication). They will also work on organizing data and graphing.

In science we completed our unit on sound and light. Moving on to Life Science, we are learning about animal characteristics and how they adapt, survive and protect themselves in their habitats and environment. The STEAM challenges have been fun as we have focused on several Halloween activities. Teams were asked to create their own "creature catchers" and make Frankenworms dance! Continuing with our STEAM challenges on Fridays, our focus will be on animal characteristics and life cycles.

In social studies we've been learning about elections. Learning about the responsibilities of the President of the United States, we discussed what it means to be a citizen of the USA. We will continue to follow the election process. The class will also take part in a class election where they will use their voters cards they made this month! It will be an exciting experience. The class will study Native American culture and traditions in honor of Thanksgiving.

Grades 3-4

October was a "spooktacular" month for the Calculation Crew! Scary was the name of the game with our read aloud this past month. Students were glued to the edge of their seats with Mary Downing Hawn's ghost story, *Deep and Dark and Dangerous*. Predictions were flying from the get-go and many students were right - Sissy was a ghost and a nasty one at that! Now it's onto Robert Hoge's memior, *Ugly*. Students have been quick to make connections to one of our favorite read alouds from last year, *Wonder*, by R.J. Palacio. We can tell already, tears and laughter are in our future with this story. Reading workshop received an awesome boost thanks to the 20 new graphic novels Mrs. Smith added to our classroom library. Thanks to all the end of the year Amazon gift cards from last school year, this year's Grade 3 and 4 students are loving the breadth of choice they have when it comes to choosing a book to get lost in!

Google Docs has taken our writing workshop to a whole new level. As students become more adapt at typing their stories, they are also sharing their pieces with fellow classmates. Students are able to help one another revise and edit using this technology and thus make changes on the spot. Besides publishing, we continue to free write daily in our writing notebooks. Everyone's favorite

part of workshop is hands down sharing in our beloved blue bean bag - Big Joe. Authors sit in Big Joe as the audience listens to continuations of their favorite authors. By choice, some students have expanded their tales by up to eight and nine chapters! Our authors are writing an array of personal narratives, fantasy, poems, graphic novels, and picture book stories. A big thanks to Dr. Ellis for visiting our workshop to teach us about Prove Its! We've found many places in our writing we can bring to life for the reader with this helpful strategy.



We've been moving right along in math workshop. Thanks to Worker Bee Wednesday volunteers, we have a plethora of games we can play during workshop math practice. Students have practiced rounding up to hundred thousand, estimating sums and differences with rounding, using mental math to add and subtract by making ten and hundred, and adding/subtracting with regrouping. Students are realizing that mental math strategies not only make adding and subtracting easier, but they are learning much needed processes which will be used in algebraic thinking. Each time we practice our daily skills, we also challenge our thinking with enrichment activities. Special congratulations to Alexandra Shupe for being the only student to figure out our Halloween number box challenge. Moving forward, students will take their understanding of place value and basic repeated addition and apply them to multiplication and division as well as using their fact knowledge to problem solve.

As we prepare our portfolios, students realized just how much ground they have covered in Social Studies. Culminating their study of map skills, students created their own countries. Creativity shined bright as students presented countries such as Breeds (with states like Pugslyvania and Collie-rado) as well as explaining the landmarks of each country (think swimming in Sweet Ocean of the country, Candy Land , but be careful to stay inside the Bubble Gum Border). The upcoming Presidential election provides the perfect springboard into our next area of study - the history of the American beginnings along with American Civics.

Science has been full STEAM ahead! We've completed multiple experiments this past month that have given us great insights into our study of objects and









motions. We have created hovercrafts, measured the distance of cars traveling down ramps with a variety of incline levels, moved cars with magnets, used static electric to move tissue paper ghosts and bats, captured smoke from dry ice with overflowing bubbles, blown up ghostly balloons not using our own breath but gas from a chemical reaction, watched spiders float up and down in lava lamps, and propelled Halloween candy with handmade catapults. Through our tinkering and failed attempts, we learned several important lessons; I.

failure is a great teacher of what doesn't work yet moves us closer to success each time, 2. scientists must persevere to gain knowledge and understanding of how things work, and 3. objects can move with a variety of sources including gravity, our own pushes and pulls, as well as different forms of energy such as static, magnetic forces, and gas. Up next in science is the study of life cycles and group behaviors.

Grades 5-8 Language Arts and 7-8 Social Studies

Reading and writing have taken off in the classroom! Students are engaged in their books in reading workshop and enjoy discussing them during conferences.

In grades 5 and 6, the daily read aloud of *Pax* by Sara Pennypacker gives us a chance to discuss story elements and author's craft in a genre that is new to most students. It's impressive to listen to the depth of thought contributed by fifth and sixth graders during these discussions! Students have had many great mentor authors to study and learn from as they've read several books since the start of school. For their first publication, each writer has chosen a personal

narrative to revise and publish using tools learned through their reading as well as mini-lessons and individual conferences. These published pieces will be added to student portfolios.

In grades 7 and 8, the daily read aloud of *Colin Fischer* by Ashley Edward Miller and Zack Stentz gives us a chance to discuss story elements and author's craft. Students are becoming more critical readers and are stretching each other to



think with more depth. Students have had many great mentor authors to study and learn from as they've read several books since the start of school. For their first publication, each writer has written two or three free-verse poems to revise and publish using tools learned through their reading of poetry, mini-lessons and individual conferences — tools used by published authors to appeal to the senses and strengthen verbs, leads, conclusions, titles, lines, and stanzas. These published pieces will be added to student portfolios. memoirs. In reading workshop we will begin our reading roundtable discussions.

Students have learned about the use of propaganda in WWII through analysis of posters, documentaries, and research. They studied the different types of propaganda and how each was used to further the cause of the Nazi regime. Students also learned about the use of spin in political ads, tv commercials, print ads, and social media. Through skits and the creation of a poster, students demonstrated their understanding of how propaganda and spin are used to influence others. Our next unit involves learning about different types of governments. Students will work with a partner to research two types of governments and will present their findings to the class.

Grades 5-8 Math and Science and 5-6 Social Studies

Mrs. Williams' classes are learning by leaps and bounds.

In 5th and 6th grades, the Einsteins have been hard at work in math. We have studied fraction operations, integer operations, and our 6th graders began learning about rates and ratios by planning road trips. Our focus in science has been matter and chemical reactions. Students applied their knowledge of physical and chemical properties by solving a mystery of a "stolen necklace." They were able to discover the thief by identifying the unknown powder left behind at the crime scene.

Social Studies focused on the American Revolution. Students completed personal research project and presented their topic to the class. Students also created cereal boxes focusing on one person important to the American Revolution. Our next topic will be government and voting.

The 7th and 8th grade class has also been learning some great things in math. Our 7th graders have been studying geometry. They have studied rectangular prisms, pyramids, circles, and cylinders. In 8th grade, students have been working on graphing linear inequalities and were also introduced to domain and range.

In Science, students have extended their knowledge of cells by learning about the organelles present in both plants and animal cells. Students are working hard on their life size cells using paper mache.


