3-8 Language Arts

Students are already immersed in books in reading workshop and their topics in writing workshop. We begin each reading class with a teacher read-aloud. In grades 3-5 we're reading *The Mysterious Benedict Society* by Trenton Lee Stewart, and in grades 6-8 we're reading *Summer of Fear* by Lois Duncan.



The students are engrossed in the books and always begging for the next chapter. They then find their spots in the classroom where they can get lost in their own books during independent reading time.

In writing workshop we have completed several prewriting activities including Writing Territories and Blueprinting to help students find topics to write about. They are now getting lost in their own writing.









We end the class time each day with students voluntarily sharing their writing and other students sharing something they like about the piece.

We are getting to know the students as readers and writers as we confer individually during reading and writing. Our goal is that students love reading and writing so much that they have that intrinsic desire to read and write when they are not in school. 
upcoming lessons and activities. Right now, we are working on various number concepts...depending on what each group needs! These groupings will be flexible and will change as students grow!


3-8 Social Studies








Art
